The artist drew inspiration from the landscape of rural Wales to create the series of watercolours.

push the boundaries of

The installation pushes the boundaries of what we traditionally consider to be sculpture.

resonate with an audience

A film that resonates with its audience on an emotional level is far more memorable than one that simply entertains.

provoke debate / controversy

The artist's decision to portray a political figure in such a way provoked considerable controversy.

Important Differences & Confusing Words

Critique vs Criticism vs Review

These three words are often confused, but they carry distinct meanings in the context of culture and the arts.

Word	Meaning	Register	Example
critique	A detailed, analytical evaluation of a work — can be positive or negative; focuses on both strengths and weaknesses	Formal / Academic	<i>She wrote a thorough critique of the novel for her university seminar.</i>
criticism	Often implies finding fault or disapproval; in academic contexts, it also means the scholarly analysis of literature or art	Formal / General	<i>The film faced heavy criticism for its portrayal of historical events.</i>
review	A journalistic evaluation of a work — typically written for a newspaper, magazine, or website; intended for a general audience	Neutral / Journalistic	<i>I always read the reviews before deciding which films to see at the cinema.</i>

Contemporary vs Modern vs Current

These adjectives all relate to time but are used in subtly different ways in arts and culture contexts.

Word	Meaning in Context	Example
contemporary	Belonging to the present time; also means existing at the same time as a person or event. Often used in formal or artistic contexts.	<i>This gallery specialises in contemporary photography.</i>
modern	Can refer to the present or to a historical period (e.g. "Modern art" often refers to art from roughly 1860–1970). Can sound slightly informal.	<i>The museum has a wing dedicated to modern art, including Picasso and Matisse.</i>
current	Refers specifically to the present moment — often used for trends, events, or situations happening right now. Not typically used to describe artistic style.	<i>The current exhibition runs until the end of March.</i>

Audience vs Spectator vs Viewer

All three words describe people who watch or listen, but they are not always interchangeable.

Word	Typical Context	Example
audience	A group of people attending a live performance (theatre, concert, lecture) or watching/reading a media product. Collective noun.	<i>The audience erupted into applause at the end of the symphony.</i>
spectator	Someone who watches an event, often a sporting event or public display. Suggests a more passive role.	<i>Thousands of spectators lined the streets to watch the carnival procession.</i>

Word	Typical Context	Example
viewer	Someone who watches television, a film, or an online video. Also used for people visiting a gallery.	The documentary attracted over five million viewers on its opening night.

Common Mistakes

Even advanced learners make errors when discussing culture, entertainment and the arts. Here are the most frequent mistakes to avoid.

✗ *The film was very boring and I didn't like the histoire.*

✓ **plot / storyline / narrative** — *The film was rather tedious and the **plot** lacked any real tension or originality.*

✗ *She made a great acting in the play.*

✓ **delivered / gave a great performance** — *She **delivered a brilliant performance** in the play and received outstanding reviews.*

✗ *The book was very thought-provoking and made me think many things.*

✓ **raised / explored / provoked** — *The book was deeply thought-provoking and **raised important questions** about social inequality.*

✗ *I saw a film of horror last night.*

✓ **a horror film** — *I watched **a horror film** last night and barely slept afterwards.*

✗ *The critiques of the audience were very positive after the show.*

✓ **The reaction / response of the audience** — *The **audience's response** was overwhelmingly positive, with a lengthy standing ovation.*

✗ *The painter painted a very abstract picture with no sense.*

✓ **convey meaning / make sense of** — *The painter created a deeply abstract work that invites viewers to **interpret its meaning** for themselves.*

✗ *Mozart was a contemporary composer. (when referring to his historical period)*

✓ **an eighteenth-century / classical composer** — *Mozart was **an eighteenth-century classical composer** whose work continues to captivate audiences today.*

Part 1: Multiple Choice

1. **B** **Correct Answer: evocative**

✓ **Explanation:** To **blur the boundaries** is a common collocation meaning to make the distinctions between two things less clear or defined. *Modern technology has blurred the boundaries between music and visual art.* The other options suggest making boundaries stronger or more fixed, which contradicts the meaning.
